

Background

The original Craigmillar Festival, run by the Craigmillar Festival Society, started in 1962 and ran for over 40 years, acting as a 'catalyst for social change'. It paved the way for, and inspired, many other local community arts initiatives all across the world. The festival celebrated the local community coming together to present a rich and diverse programme for

everyone to enjoy and participate.

The 2022 Festival was the second year reviving the historic festival and legacy of community arts celebrating the diversity of cultures and shared and individual stories from the community.

As the second year of the revival, the 2022 Festival continues to engage the community and act as a springboard for the return of an annual community festival in Craigmillar and Niddrie for years to come.

Executive Summary

The Craigmillar and Niddrie Community Festival brought together a wide range of working partnerships that delivered many benefits and opportunities for the local area. The Festival created:

- An exciting and interesting programme of events and projects attracting engagement with a wide variety of audiences and participants

- 98% of attendees said they felt more connected to others in the community after attending the festival












Walk-Up Avenue

The Festival weekend saw the opening of a new community space, Walk-Up Avenue, which will provide a community cafe-style space, picnic tables and performance area to the public.

During the festival, it was used as a marketplace with stalls available for local sellers and organisations to set up shop and information points for festival attendees to shop and visit.

The space included live performances from Scottish Chamber Orchestra, Puppeteers, and Chris Tracey. Information stalls included Unison Health, Capability Scotland, Let's Talk, Edinburgh Tool Library and the University of Edinburgh. Many local artists and sellers also participated selling artwork, bath bombs, accessories and ginger beer as well as hosting workshops for children.


- I hope that in the future, the promotion of the festival will be intensified and more people will be invited to participate
